- 1. Wide variety of plants like plants placed in clumps
- 2. Avoid hybrid plants with double blooms, pollinators find little sustenance in them
- 3. Pesticides eliminate use whenever possible. Use soaps, Neem oil, etc. at night when bees and butterflies are less active

Coreopsis.	Tiarella cordifolia
Salidago.	Phlox divaricate
