MANAGING STORMWATER

In April, residents experienced a significant flooding event with more than 6 inches of rain falling over a few days. Following the storms, city staff conducted assessments of areas with reported concerns and observed flooding. We continue to encourage residents to report any drainage concerns to the City. Concerns may range from noticing a clogged drain along the street's edge, water topping or ponding on your street, or areas of erosion near a drainage pipe or culvert.

The City is working to increase the frequency of our routine inspections and to identify both short-term and longterm repairs and public improvement projects as part of a new long-term maintenance plan. Additionally, we will continue with proactive maintenance efforts such as our monthly street sweeping and annual creek debris removal program. In this fiscal year, the City has budgeted to complete two stormwater repair projects. One project will be completed in the 600 block of Lynnwood Boulevard, where a pipe collapsed and will require replacement with a new culvert under the roadway. Second, a small section of stormwater drainage pipe must be replaced at the cul-de-sac end of Walnut Drive. As soon as a schedule is available from the city's contractor, residents of those areas will be notified of the specific dates for those improvements. These initiatives help to manage runoff from rain, mitigate damage from flooding, and protect the quality of the water in our creeks and streams.

EXPLORING BELLE MEADE HISTORY: Iris City USA

In "Belle Meade: A Legacy of Land, Lives, and Love", author Ridley Wills II recounts how four Nashville residents and their gardens contributed to the state flower, which had been the daisy, becoming the iris in the 1930s. Notably, James Hampton Kirkland, who moved to Belle Meade following his retirement as Chancellor of Vanderbilt University (1893-1937), earned a national reputation as an iris hybridizer that was nearly equal to his renown as Chancellor. He grew iris where the medical school is today and at his home on Jackson

Boulevard just east of Belle Meade Boulevard.

In 1938, he won the Dykes Medal for "Copper Lustre", a striking gold and copper bearded iris, said to "sparkle in the sunlight like a new penny". This color iris was a novelty until it was first shown in the Chancellor's garden. His garden, behind

his home, was one of the gardens attracting annual visitors from across the country to pay homage to his interesting collection of irises, all attractively planted.

GOOD NEIGHBOR REMINDER

Distracted driving is a major cause of accidents in Belle Meade and Tennessee. Any driver's distraction, whether from a cell phone or some other activity, can lead to fines, points on their license, vehicle accidents, and potentially life-threatening injuries. Please be alert and defensive when driving. Specifically, at the intersection of Belle Meade Blvd and Jackson Blvd, in recent weeks there have been four vehicle crashes, some with injuries, due to drivers running the stop signs. Running a stop sign is a class

C misdemeanor in Tennessee, which can result in fines up to \$50 and/or 30 days in jail. A conviction will add points to a driver's

record. Since January 1, 2024, for violations of the Tennessee Hands-Free law by teens under 18, a second or subsequent violation will land 7 points on their driving record, which would likely result in a suspended license as drivers under 18 can only accumulate six points per calendar year. RECAP OF BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS' MEETINGS

The Commissioners took action on the following items at the, October 15, 2025 meeting:



- Approved, on final reading, Ordinance 2025-9 amending Title 5
 Municipal Finance and Taxation, to make three (3) amendments
 to the city's policies:
 - o Amending the value of contracts requiring Board of Commissioners' approval from \$3,000 to \$25,000 and aligning it with the existing threshold established for competitive sealed bids.
 - o Amending the list of city officials authorized to sign checks to additionally include the city manager; and
 - o Amending policies related to internal controls to remove and replace a requirement for the Board of Commissioners to approve all invoices over \$5,000 with a requirement for the Board of Commissioners to review a complete list of all checks written each month.
- Approved, on final reading, Ordinance 2025-10 amending the current year budget; most significant was the addition of \$400,000 in capital expenditures to support the construction of traffic calming islands on West Tyne Drive and Lynnwood Boulevard.
- Approved, on the 1st of 2 readings, Ordinance 2025-12 amending Municipal Court costs from \$95 to \$105 effective January 1, 2026.

- Approved a 1-year contract extension with Clean Earth Collections for brush collection through November 30, 2026 (no cost increase).
- Approved a 1-year contract extension with Sammie Gibbs Construction for snow and ice removal (as needed) through November 30, 2026 (no cost increase).
- Approved a Parade Permit for the annual Belle Meade Boulevard Bolt for Thursday, November 27, 2025 on Belle Meade Boulevard.
- Accepted two grants, totaling \$45,000, from the Tennessee Highway Safety Office supporting traffic enforcement efforts by the Belle Meade Police Department.
- Approved expenditures not to exceed \$25,000 for tree replacements on Belle Meade Boulevard.
- Approved a Resolution No. 2025-08 declaring end-of-life IT hardware as surplus city property.
- Approved all invoices over \$5,000 as presented.
- The Board of Commissioners' next regular meeting will be held on Wednesday, November 19th at 4:00 p.m.
